

Hymnal History by Matthew Lane

brief look at the origin and evolution of some of our favourite hymns.

The music to O Come, O Come Emmanuel comes from a 15th century French burial processional. The text for the verses is built on refrains (Antiphons) sung for vespers (or Evening Prayer) during the last seven days of Advent, and the Latin text for the hymn dates from at least 1710. The refrains (Antiphons) that give the first line of each verse come from no later than the 6th century. The text became famous due to its teaching in Jesuit schools.

Prepare the Way, O Zion is a Swedish variant of a

German folk tune from the late 17th century. Its first Swedish appearance was in the handwritten 1695 hymn book of Riddarholm church, a site most famous as the final resting place of most of the Swedish Royals.

The text to Once in Royal David's City was written by Cecil Frances Alexander, the wife of an Anglican bishop, for her book Hymns for Little Children. The same woman wrote the words to "All Things Bright and Beautiful." For nearly 100 years now, the King's College Chapel (Cambridge) Christmas Eve service has begun with the hymn, with the first verse always sung by a solo boy chorister.

Lo, How a Rose E'er



Blooming's earliest German text was probably written around the time of Martin Luther, and the hymn was first published in 1599 in Germany's Rhineland. The 1609 harmonization by Michael Praetorius is still largely in use today. During Nazi rule, the words were temporarily changed in an attempt to eradicate the Jewish history of Jesus, and to glorify Germany ("A light has arisen for us on a dark winter's night. Thus, faith is rekindled in German lands.")

He will come, will come, will come like crying in the night, like blood, like breaking, as the earth writhes to toss him free. He will come like a child.



s we begin a new Christian year with Advent One and enter into the Christmas season, I am encouraged as I read the words for this season in 1 Thessalonians 3:12: "may the Lord make you increase and abound in love for one another and for all, just as we abound in love for you." Timothy has just brought a report from the Thessalonican church to the apostle Paul, and it is an encouraging report. These peoples' faith has been an example to all. Now Paul encourages them even more by asking all believers to increase their love for each other. What a wonderful prayer this is for us today as we begin this new Christian year and as we celebrate God's incarnation.
