## Par - by Jaques Diotte

#### Support your Parish through an automatic monthly withdrawal

Recently you have been asked to select which type of envelope you wish to receive for your 2023 tithing. Again, we have a real opportunity in eliminating some of the cost associated in buying physical envelopes and the work in handling these on an on-going basis. How can we do this?

We can individually contribute in reducing the cost by using the <u>electronic envelope system</u>. In today's age of electronic giving, the Pre- Authorized Remittance (PAR) program helps congregations receive the offering / tithing on a monthly basis through automatic debit.

PAR allows parishioners to give intentionally, proportionally and faithfully to the Parish, even when they are not able to be there in person. This helps provide the Parish with a dependable flow of contributions, makes budgeting easier, reduces paperwork, and handling, and reduces cost.

Planned gifts are one way you can help to ensure the long-term viability of our Parish and its ministry. Many people use PAR for their regular offerings, finding it a convenient way to take care of their commitment to the parish month by month.

If you have automatic debits from your bank account to pay for insurance, cable TV, taxes, fuel, or mortgage, then you already understand the PAR principle. It means regular contributions throughout the year.

It is a proven fact that in many cases when someone cannot attend a particular Sunday worship, the donation for that 'missed" Sunday is not made up when the parishioner returns. Administrative expenses however continues regardless of the revenue stream. Unless we find a way where our contributing methods aligns with on-going expenses, we will be continually challenged year over year, in meeting our obligations without creating a deficit or revenue shortage.

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# **Rev. Dorothy's Easter Message**

"I will make breath enter you, and you will come to life". [Ezekiel 37:5]

March, 2023

Dear Friends,

A couple of Sunday's ago we read this passage from Ezekiel. God took the prophet Ezekiel to a valley and gave him the vision of being surrounded by dry bones. "Can these bones live?" God asked. We do not know the answer to such questions or in fact many questions in life- but God does.

God knows the deepest realities of the human heart. He knows our every detail. Psalm 139:13ff says, *"For you created my inmost being: you knit me together in my mother's womb. I praise you because I am fearfully and wonderfully made;"*. No sculpturer or artist can look at us so attentively, and no digital pixel is strong enough to capture our exact image. God knows more than we can imagine about the thirty trillion cells of our bodies, and our two hundred and six bones in the exact order. God's knowledge of us is not only theoretical or cerebral. He also sees the hidden realities of our beings and minds.

Our God is the God of details. He knows every detail of his creation. He is present in every detail of our lives. For He is omniscient, omnipresent, and omnipotent. God knew that his beloved creation had disobeyed him, so he planned out the rescue mission for them. The super- hero 'Son of Man' came down to Earth to deliver his creation from sin and spiritual death. That hero was his only begotten Son, Jesus Christ.

Jesus knew exactly what was his purpose on Earth. He knew all the details of his mission. He also knew the hidden desires of his disciples, of the Jews and even the Roman soldiers. He knew everything, he was aware of every detail, yet he chose to fulfill his mission, and deliver us from death and Hell.

In Jesus we have this hope for our present, and faith in the future, that no matter how complex our lives are, or how complicated our problems maybe -yet, God is in control of everything.

Throughout the chaos of the 'Passion Week' when all seemed lost- yet, God was in control of everything. Resurrection morning is the proof of God's master plan. Let us rejoice in the knowledge that God knows and loves every detail of our lives.


'Therefore, let us rejoice and be glad in Him'.


